

What is Girl Scouts?


Girl Scouts is the one activity where she can put on a play, go camping, explore the cosmos, and stand up for her beliefs—all with friends who share common values.

It's also a supportive community. Being a Girl Scout makes girls part of something bigger than themselves. It means they're part of a movement working toward a more fair, equal, and compassionate world where everyone can make their dreams come true. (See our values in the **Promise and Law** below.)

Girl Scouts continuously try new things and test their limits, all with the goal of making their communities and the world a better place. While one girl can make a difference, there's no limit to what a unified movement of Girl Scouts across the globe can accomplish.

How does it work?

- Girls can join Girl Scouts at any point in grades K-12.
- Membership is just \$25. You'll join a group of girls and families called a troop and get a full year of adventures, including trips, events, and special programs. Financial assistance is available.
- Troops may charge moderate dues (\$20-60/year) for supplies and badges.
- Uniforms (\$40-60/year) are recommended, but not required. One uniform can be used for up to two years.
- Girl Scouts explore a wide range of activities, including the outdoors, science, entrepreneurship, and life skills—guided by adult volunteers.
- Girls lead the way, exploring areas that excite them the most, and they earn badges to reflect successes and show the world what they're made of.

Ways Adults Can Help

Each troop needs the help of adults to provide a quality Girl Scout experience. When you volunteer, you not only make a difference for the girls, but you have the opportunity to join in the fun, share your skills, or even try something new!

The Troop Committee is the adult leadership team for a Girl Scout troop. Troop Committee members may include parent/caregivers, adult family members, Girl Scout alums, or community members. Consider offering to help with one of the positions below.

Typical Troop Committee Roles

- **Troop Leaders (2 required)**

Help girls have fun with a purpose. Using the Girl Scout Leadership Experience (GSLE), the troop leader guides girls as they engage in age-appropriate activities that are girl-led, cooperative, and hands-on. Online planning tools, training, and support provided. All troops must have two appointed troop leaders to begin meeting.

- **Troop Assistants (as many as needed)**

A variety of support roles are needed; training and support is available to get you started. Here are a few common ways you can help the troop leaders:

Treasurer: Manage the troop's finances and be a signer on the troop bank account.

Camping: Complete outdoor training to learn skills to help girls plan and experience day or overnight camp, including fire building, cooking, and outdoor activities.

Driver: Help plan, prepare, and travel for troop trips. Ranges from guiding girls at planning meetings to simply driving/chaperoning on trips.

First-Aider: Maintain adult and pediatric CPR and basic First Aid certification through a qualifying agency and be available to attend troop trips. Provide First Aid or CPR as needed.

- **Troop Assistant - Cookie Manager or Fall Product Manager (1-2 needed)**

Manage troop's participation in the Cookie Program or Fall Product Program. Learn the ins and outs of managing the program, including important dates, parent/caregiver communication, inventory management, safety, and more. Ensure troop follow proper policies and procedures related to the program. Training and support provided.



How to Get Involved

The whole family has opportunities to participate!

- Attend one or more meetings
- Provide a place for outdoor activities
- Assist with troop money earning
- Lead a hike
- Provide space for storage, equipment
- Send communications/reminders
- Donate supplies
- Provide a meeting place
- Provide occasional snacks for meetings
